Principal's foreword

Introduction

This document reports on the characteristics of Kia Ora SS and contains information regarding the school context, staff information, professional development undertaken, key student outcomes, student attendance rates, the National Assessment Program and results of Student, Parent and Staff satisfaction with the quality of education offered here at Kia Ora SS.

School progress towards its goals in 2013

All students made progress in the improvement of their learning outcomes in Literacy and Numeracy through an extra focus on Literacy and Numeracy Pedagogy, Resources and Early Intervention. The use of ICT's was further embedded across the KLA's.

Many opportunities were provided for parents to become involved in their child's education as well as the broader community as outside providers of the curriculum and through the volunteer scheme and social events.

Future outlook

During 2014 the school priorities will be:

- Implementation of Australian Curriculum - Geography
- Further improvement in Literacy and Numeracy outcomes for each individual student
- Early and continuing intervention for identified students through employment of another teacher.
- Focus on improvement in Spelling, Comprehension and Maths Investigations outcomes through consistent whole school pedagogy.
- Provision of Professional Development of staff in line with the school direction.
- Further improvement of school physical environment e.g. grounds, computers and play equipment.
- Creation of opportunities for students to participate in interschool educational and social activities.

Characteristics of the student body:

Kia Ora SS is composed of three multi-age classes and promotes a family atmosphere. Thus the school is able to provide individual attention and learning at the child's ability level. The students have a rural background with families living on acreage – some working the land and others working in nearby Gympie and enjoying the rural lifestyle.

The children are from English speaking backgrounds and there are not any Special Needs children enrolled.

Curriculum offerings

Our distinctive curriculum offerings

As well as the mandatory Key Learning Areas of the Queensland Curriculum, staff at Kia Ora SS focus on the social and emotional well-being of students and the preparation in this area of the students for adult life.

Kia Ora SS offers after school physical activities once per week for two hours..

Providers from the wider community including businesses and parents also provide lessons in the various skills they possess.e.g. Art Gallery, parent skills – knot tying etc

How Information and Communication Technologies are used to assist learning

The student: computer ratio lies at 1:3 at present with the replacement of 6 computers during the year. The number of computers in the P-2 room was increased by 4.

25 I pads were purchased and appropriate Curriculum aps installed for student use.

Kia Ora SS has an agreed emphasis on the use of computers throughout the school. Computers are integrated across all Learning Areas. All students (including Preps) regularly access software programs such as Photostory, Microsoft Word, Paint. Excel and Movie Maker for presentation of assessment items as well as for use in daily learning. Children receive and return work through email. Older students study courses through The Learning Place.

Teaching staff integrate the use of computers into all aspects of planning, delivery, assessment and

Reporting of curriculum.

Units of work as well as assessment items involve the use of computers by the students.

Academic Reporting, Student Behaviour, Curriculum plans, Intervention Plans and student results are all stored on OneSchool. All staff and school records are held digitally e.g. timesheets and finance.

Social climate

At Kia Ora SS students learn in a safe secure environment. Students can learn and socialise in a happy and friendly atmosphere. The multi-age structure fosters the family-like environment as the older and younger students regularly play and learn together. Students are encouraged to be self-motivated and to “Give their best.” Students learn to work independently as well as in smaller and larger groups.

Our highly successful Behaviour Management Program encourages responsibility by the student for their behaviour and rewards appropriate behaviour standards.

The School Opinion Survey revealed that both Parents and Students are extremely happy to our school community.

Parent, student and staff satisfaction with the school

Parents noted a high degree of satisfaction with the education that their child is receiving at school and with the school itself. The vast majority of the staff were very satisfied with the access provided to professional development and morale was high. Students were more satisfied that they were getting a good education at the school and all scores had shown improvement. Staff satisfaction also rated very highly with all but one category rating 100%.

Involving parents in their child's education

Many parents are involved in the education of the students at Kia Ora SS and are encouraged to be so. Apart from monthly P&C meetings and tuckshop, many parents volunteer to spend time in the classroom. The school has the Ready Reader program in place as well as volunteers who work in the office and library. Some parents are directly involved in curriculum delivery (Art, knot-tying) and taking small groups in the classroom. Often parents can be seen playing with the children during recess and are present in large numbers at school events.

Reducing the school's environmental footprint

Data is sourced from school's annual utilities return and is reliant on the accuracy of these returns.

During 2013 Kia Ora SS attempted to reduce its environmental footprint. Gardens were kept covered with mulch and the development of the waterless garden continued. Education in the areas of Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle were once again delivered by Ellie from Cleanaway. The solar panels continued to feed power into the grid to reduce electricity usage.

The students undertook a highly successful recycling project by recycling metal "junk" found in the dump or around

the house and turning it into "animals" which they had welded with the help of a parent. The art Gallery personnel were so impressed the children were offered a space in the Art Gallery for their works during which time many were sold.





Achievement – Closing the Gap

Indigeneous students have maintained progress at a rate comparable to the non-indigeneous students through the school's use of teacher-aides to support learning in the classroom. Attendance rates have also been more than comparable.
